






Long-Time Volunteers Recognized at Annual Meeting

Living with History: Historic Homes Tour of Greater West Bloomfield Saturday, June 21, 10am – 4pm



Local History & GWBHS Inspire Students' Academic Pursuits

GWBHS provides great ways for people of all ages to explore and connect with local history. Here are some young people who have been inspired to learn more.

A teacher's assistant during the Apple Island archaeological dig, Skylar Bauer shared her research work at the Apple Island Spring Forum in April. Originally from Mt. Airy, Maryland, she is seeking a Western Michigan University Master's Degree in Anthropology and plans to write her thesis about the archaeology of lived religion at Apple Island.

Mark Hoock is an Anthropology PhD candidate at American University in Washington, D.C. He is considering a dissertation about how processes that reproduce and reinforce our social structure exist in many social spaces, including landscapes of recreation. He aims to use archaeological investigations from Apple Island to infer how the residents maintained or changed their behaviors. Hoock will lead WMU students in 2014 Apple Island summer field work.

Catherine Cangany, PhD, Assistant Professor of History at the University of Notre Dame, presented the March GWBHS event Detroit: "Detroit: Early America's Frontier Seaport." "This book began in 2005 as a doctoral dissertation at U-M, inspired by my work as a curator at GWBHS.

As I was completing graduate coursework about colonial America, I was also devising museum exhibits in Orchard Lake about nineteenth-century West Bloomfield...I realized that there must be some way to connect what I was reading in the classroom with what I was creating in the museum." Nearly a decade later, it became the book: Frontier Seaport: Detroit's Transformation into an Atlantic Entrepôt.








40 Years: GWBHS & Apple Island CELEBRATING





celebrates its 40th anniversary (1974-2014), here is a look back at the Society's involvement with Apple Island.

Apple Island has always been a special place, first to the American Indians and then as a peaceful summer home. Today it is a place to experience nature and uncover the history beneath its surface.

Officially known as the Marjorie Ward Strong Woodland Sanctuary since 1970, the island has benefitted from wide community interest and support to sustain its natural habitats and maintain safe access. The West Bloomfield School District owns the island and students have visited to study its geography and ecology. GWBHS guided tours of the island for second graders each spring and fall are just one of the ways the Society keeps local residents connected to Apple Island.

GWBHS has made the study of Apple Island an important part of its activities for over 30 years. Since 1982, the Society has been coordinating annual tours of the island to give the public a chance to experience this place of natural beauty and its rich local history. The St. Francis Foundation of Michigan has long been a generous supporter of GWBHS's activities on the island. Most recently, its grants have funded archaeological digs that have led to the application for Apple Island to be added to the National Register of Historic Places.











Timeline of Apple Island & GWBHS





197

The Marjorie Ward Strong Woodland Sanctuary, commonly known as Apple Island (AI), is deeded to the West Bloomfield School District (WBSD) in a dedication ceremony attended by Governor Milliken.

1974

WBSD biology students walk across frozen lake to study the effects of winter weather on AI vegetation.

1977

WB Newcomers Club sponsors free Al tours, led by FOAI members. Girl Scouts gather trash.

1978

18 WBSD students receive a \$27,182 DNR grant to spend 40-hour summer weeks extending and improving trails. Trail markers, erosion-control landscaping and outhouses are built.

1982

GWBHS holds its first Al tours on the third weekend in May.

1994

Eagle Scouts complete a project that began in 1986 to construct a 64-foot walking bridge over Al pond.

1997

Orchard Lake Middle School music teacher comissions a musical tribute to Al history called "Apple Island Legend."

200

Archaeology students from St. Mary's University & Cranbrook Institute of Science dig on AI, discovering a silver cross and tinkle-cone ornament.

2004

"Island of Time" (IOT) includes a Living History Encampment at Orchard Lake St. Mary's Schools, Michigan Week Community Awards Breakfast and Al tours.

2010

Archaeological techniques workshop students discover an American Indian campsite.

2013

GWBHS receives a \$10,000 SFFM grant to fund Drs. LouAnn Wurst and David Brose, along with a team of WMU anthropology students, to survey AI, collect artifacts and dig test pits.

1973

West Bloomfield (WB) Optimist and Countryside Improvement Association donate funds to purchase pontoon boats.

1976

HS Ecology Club students initiate the formation of the Friends of Apple Island, Inc. (FOAI), a community-wide organization for all ages.



1979

70 people cross-country ski to AI, sponsored by WB Parks & Recreation and FOIA.

1980

FOAI leads four seasonal events annually. It receives a DNR nature trails grant.

1983

WBSD high school biology students analyze AI ecology.

1996

GWBHS leads tours for WBSD second-graders of Al and Orchard Lake Museum. The tours continue to the present.

1998

An \$8,000 West/Media One grant funds a six-week WBHS cartology project using GPS to collect data, compile charts and develop AI maps.

1999

GWBHS receives a \$4,800 grant from the St. Francis Foundation of Michigan (SFFM).

2003

Cranbrook and Madonna staff lead Milford and Huron Valley students on an archaeological dig, finding a military button. Madonna University offers archeology and ecology summer workshops.

2008

U-M, Madonna University, WBSD and GWBHS offer a Great Lakes Archaeology course. Dr. David Brose leads excavation and testing of "Pontiac's Mound", found only to be a natural area.

2011

GWBHS completes Al improvements with Scotch School student donation funds.



2014

Another \$10,000 grant from The SFFM will continue the work of the WMU team. Dr. LouAnn Wurst submits forms for Michigan Historic Site and National Register of Historic Places designations.
