Oak Hill Beach Club Celebrates 100 Years

The Oak Hill Beach Club is a 7-unit vacation home on Cass Lake, built in 1915 by Samuel Abelson of Maybury Grand Ave in Detroit. Members celebrated the Club's 100 years with a birthday party on July 11, 2015.

In the early months of 1915, seven families met at a home on Pacific Avenue in Detroit. They all belonged to the Grand River Methodist Church on McGraw, later to become the Nardin Park M. E. Church, and all lived within a couple of miles of that church. They met to establish the Oak Hill Beach Club as a corporation, and to pool their money for the building of a unique summer cottage for their families in the up-and-coming resort area of Cass Lake.

For the summer of 1915, the families camped on the site while the building was erected. Marion Wells was 7 years old and recalled starting the trip on the Interurban at Grand River and McGraw, picking up members along the way. Popcorn was a treat on the long ride to Keego Harbor. From Strong's Landing, a boat service carried them to the property on the north shore of Cass Lake. They lived in tents and cooked on kerosene stoves that summer. The children carried water in assorted pails from Mr. Watchpocket's farm, spilling half of it along the way. The building was finished by that fall, with seven attached units, a style referred to as a 'terrace'.

In subsequent years, the women and children packed up and stayed for the summer, while the men commuted from the city for the weekends in one car. A boat from Strong's carried them between Keego Harbor and the cottage on Friday and Sunday nights. A well was dug; a dock and steps down the hill were added; a screened porch and a breakwater were the cause of much



debate. Electricity came to the neighborhood in 1923. Cars became common and a parking lot was added. Later, a new outhouse with flush toilets was built.

That outhouse is now on the city sewer, but there is still no running water inside the units. This is no longer 'Up North', and

people no longer travel from the city. Instead they live close by and come for the day or the weekend or just for dinner. Several of our families have owned their units for many decades, including the Gizas in Unit 6, the Clarks in Unit 2, and the Rowlands in Unit 3. Unit 7, belonging to Jane and Burton Stern, has been continuously owned by descendents of the original members, John and Grace Wells.
