
How It All Began!

As GWBHS begins its 51st year, let's reflect on the organization's formation and a 2020 letter from Mel Rycus, with homemade wine included.

On January 28, 1974, about 50 residents and local leaders from Orchard Lake formed the Orchard Lake Scenic and Historical Society to preserve local history and natural beauty. They elected Reverend Walter J. Ziemba as president and Mel Rycus as vicepresident. The group aimed to research and protect historical sites such as the Michigan Military Academy, Apple Island, and Orchard Lake Community Church, Presbyterian. By 1978, the society expanded its focus to include neighboring areas, becoming the



Greater West Bloomfield Historical Society (GWBHS). Today, GWBHS is a non-profit dedicated to collecting, preserving, researching, and stimulating public interest in the history of Keego Harbor, Orchard Lake, Sylvan Lake, and West Bloomfield.

In a 2020 letter, Mel Rycus recounted how a Labor Day picnic and his homemade dandelion wine inspired the idea for the society:

"Original facts behind the founding of the Greater West Bloomfield Historical Society: I think that it was a Labor Day picnic, on the grounds of the former Michigan Military Academy, Orchard Lake Schools. It was my first, and only,

attempt to make home brew wine. My daughters picked the dandelions from the back of our property, and I had the large demijohn canister sitting on our kitchen counter, fermenting. I brought two bottles of white dandelion wine to the picnic, and my wife, Barbara, Father Stan, and Father Wally, and I consumed a couple glasses of home brew. I mentioned to the Fathers, that someone should preserve the history and historical facts of the area. We felt that Orchard Lake, West Bloomfield, Keego Harbor, and Sylvan Lake, should all be included in the history. Father Wally and Father Stan thought that that was a great idea, and that I should be first President. I immediately declined, and after much debate, it was agreed that Father Walter Ziemba, and Mel Rycus, would co-chair the leadership, to get it off the ground. The rest is History!!!"

GWBHS Supports West Bloomfield Social Studies

West Bloomfield Schools has several new third-grade teachers and a new Michigan curriculum. Linda Kidd, GWBHS Education Committee member, has been working on primary source experiences to provide third-grade students with hands-on experiences provided by the GWBHS and Orchard Lake Museum. Linda Kidd is collaborating with third-grade teachers to use local maps, Native American artifacts, and pictures and postcards. (Some items are/were obtained from Native American sources.)



Shady Beach Subdivision Celebrates Centennial!

Shady Beach subdivision, located in the City of Orchard Lake, is an 80- acre subdivision located off Old Orchard Trail and borders Upper Straits Lake. It was first settled by the Walls family in 1837, then sold and subdivided in the 1920s. A 1923 Plat map of Shady Beach Heights along with a 1924 Plat map of Shady Beach parcels showed two separate subdivisions, recognized when the Village of Orchard Lake was incorporated in 1928. Considered as one subdivision, the 1924 date was used as the origin date for the Centennial celebration held this year.

In 1945, property owners decided to incorporate into the SBIA (Shady Beach Improvement Association). By the 1950s, Shady Beach was the most populated area of Orchard Lake.

Today it features its own boat well marina with launch, park areas, beach, and pavilion. An all-volunteer association sponsors an annual 4th of July fireworks and bike parade, a summer Music-on-the-Lake concert series, a kids' fishing tournament, an Easter egg hunt, an ice cream social, a Fall Chili Cookoff, and Trick-or-Treat on the Hill.

Association board notes and monthly member newsletters from the past relate subdivision growth:

1928: When the subdivision incorporated, roads were taken over and maintained by the Village, including garbage pickup.

1945: Due to a population boom interested in lake living, SBIA incorporates as a non-profit. An all-volunteer Board

runs the Association. Dues for membership are not mandatory.

1959: Gravel pit by the lake was developed into a recreational area for tennis, volleyball, badminton, shuffleboard, and a place to hold association dances. Because of an influx of "outsiders," Shady Beach issued beach tags.

1965-66: Annual dues set at \$10; membership of 102 families; Clinton-Oakland Sewer Disposal System comes through by millage; Teen Club formed; quarterly newsletters approved; all volunteer Beach Patrol established.

1969: Dues were \$15/year. Street signs upgraded by the City; vote to establish a Beach Patrol on an assigned basis; bylaws updated; new entrance sign; swimming lessons at the beach; dock spaces assigned to association members only.

1970-71: 115 occupied properties, 93 permanent homes; 309 residents; \$15 per dock fee established at boat marina; tennis court fenced; Edison pole installed with lights; Teen Club re-organized.

1979: 115 permanent year-round families.

2024: 184 permanent homes, membership of 136; dues are \$300 per year.

This once cottage community has succeeded for 100 years!
